"I'm saying you can't vote, Chris," Hartshorn said.

"I'm saying I can, it does not affect my property," Pierson said.

"I'm saying you don't vote. It's a joint parking lot," Hartshorn said.

Spinosa pointed out that Pierson had abstained from voting on these parking lot issues several times in the past

and said that Pierson has a direct financial interest.

Select board member Cooke offered the motion he made two weeks ago to have three loads of town gravel dumped and for the town to hire a contractor to spread it. Hartshorn and Spinosa reiterated their position that the town had fulfilled its obligation.

"I've listened carefully tonight and looked at the pictures. Obviously that grading work we just did has not improved things, it had made it

worse. I think we made a mess of it and we have to make it better. I second Logan's motion," board member Scott Kingsbury said.

Spinosa and Hartshorn voted against the motion and Cooke and Kingsbury voted for it, but it failed because it did not receive a majority of the votes from the entire board.

After the vote, Cooke said he was disappointed and now this issue would not go away. Adjoining property owner Gulisano said that it was disheartening.

"We as a community depend on you guys to make the right moves. It feels like you're stuck and you can't make the right moves. There are other issues in this room," Gulisano said.

"We had a lot of people who had a lot of Irene damage and we didn't help them in any way at all," Hartshorn said.

Nicholas Harmon told the board that he was appalled by the board's last meeting and he called for Pierson to resign. Pierson told him that after the last meeting people thanked him for looking out for them.

The meeting devolved into a shouting match requiring Hartshorn to repeatedly bang his gavel and ultimately shout at those arguing to "take it outside."

The Warren Development Review Board has scheduled a public hearing at 7:00 PM, Monday, November 17th, 2014 at the Warren Municipal Building to consider the following application.

Application 2014-70-SD, Final Plan Review: Thomas E & Charlotte L McHugh requests Final Plan Review for a proposed two lot Minor Subdivision of an existing 4.4 +/- acres parcel of land located at 46 Sugarloaf Hill Road; The applicants propose a two lot subdivision, with Lot A being 2.6 +/- acres, and Lot B being 1.8 +/- acres.

Lot B is being proposed for a single family residence with septic capacity for 4 bedrooms. An in-ground septic system is being proposed for sewage disposal and an on-site drilled well is proposed for water supply. New Lot A is not proposed for development at this time, and is meant to be joined to the existing 1.1 +/- acre house lot across Sugarloaf Hill Road. Access onto Lot B is proposed from West Hill Rd.

The property is in the Rural Residential District (Parcel Id, # 016004-500).

All applications will be reviewed the Warren Land Use and Development Regulations as adopted by the Warren Select Board on March 25, 2008 and last amended November 11, 2012.

Pursuant to 24 V.S.A. §§ 4464(a)(1)(C) and 4471(a), participation in this local proceeding is a prerequisite site to the right to take any subsequent appeal. 
Time to change clocks and check smoke detectors

On Sunday, November 2, Daylight Saving Time ends, which means it is time to change our clocks. Waitsfield-Fayston Fire Department reminds residents it is also time to change the batteries in our smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Smoke detectors also need to be replaced every 10 years and carbon monoxide detectors need to be replaced every 5 years.

Hard-wired smoke detectors require testing as well and also have a failure rate. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the maximum life cycle of a smoke detector is 10

years from the date of manufacture, not the date of installation.

Never disable a detector by borrowing its battery for another use. Following manufacturer's instructions, test all your detectors monthly and install new batteries twice a year. Many battery-powered units "chirp" or give you some other audible signal when their batteries need to be replaced. Clean your detectors. Dust and cobwebs can reduce the detector's sensitivity. Never paint a detector. Remember, only a functioning detector can protect you and your family.
